## COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Numbers included in course titles designate year of study in a multiyear sequence (i.e. French $2=2^{\text {nd }}$ year). Letters " $A$ " and " $B$ " are used to distinguish between first and second semester courses.

ENGLISH: The regular sequence for all students is $9^{\text {th }}, 10^{\text {th }}, 11^{\text {th }}$ English (composition $\&$ literature) and $12^{\text {th }}$ (Lit).

MATH: Algebra $2(\mathrm{H})$ is an accelerated second year algebra course, which allows the more capable math student to complete advanced algebra and is geared for those students wanting to follow a STEM path after high school.

RUNNING START: Statewide program which allows eligible juniors and seniors to enroll in college level courses (numbered 100 and higher) at area community colleges to receive both high school and college credit. Credit conversion: 5-quarter college credits equals 1.0 high school credit (normally transcripted as two . $50 \mathrm{R} / \mathrm{S}$ courses)

NEW MARKET VOCATIONAL SKILLS CENTER: Cooperative vocational training programs offered to juniors and seniors.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT/HONORS COURSES: (77\% scored 3, 4 or 5 on AP tests)

- English- English $9(\mathrm{H})$, English $10(\mathrm{H})$, AP English 11, AP English 12
- Math- Algebra 2 (H), AP Statistics, AP Calculus AB, AP Calculus BC, AP Computer Science
